This weekend the 75th national kendo championship took place in Areb, the capital of Nucleria. After beating his opponent, Frederick Fraser in a nail-biting match, Takumi Hawking, the 17-year old Nuclerian student has earned the gold medal and the title of Kendo Champion at the Annual Martial Arts Championships.

'I hope to inspire other youngsters to start martial arts, you never know where it's going to lead you', Hawking said after becoming the youngest champion in the history of Kendo.

With his sense for fair play and likable nature, Takumi Hawking has captured the hearts of the Nuclerian population. He has devoted his life to training the martial arts since he was 5 years old. In his family, it is an age-old tradition for the men to practice Kendo.

It has always been his dream to follow in the footsteps of his ancestors. Hawking is the third in his family to win the championship. During the medal ceremony Hawking thanked his family for inspiring him to work hard and not to give up during tough times.

He now first plans to finish his education while continuing to pursuing his passion for Kendo. 'This is only the beginning, I have a lot of fight left in me', he said.

It is Takumi's dream to begin his own fighting dojo with multiple different fighting styles, where he will give classes and also follow them. He would love to learn the next generation how to fight and share
